Expanded Course Description:

This course focuses on all aspects of language and literacy development in young children. Emphasis is placed on integrating of all dimensions of literacy across all early childhood environments. Applying theory to practical applications in teaching are explored. *A minimum of 5 hours field experience will be included.*

Lecture, class discussion, project presentation, and practice with young children will be the main instructional methods for this course. Establishing a Print Rich Environment, developing language and literacy activities that are developmentally appropriate for young children and creating activities to encourage families to promote language and literacy development with their children will be emphasized.

A minimum of 5 hours of field experience is required.

Key Assessments will include:

- 1. Print Rich Environment Observation
- 2. Language & Literacy activity for children
- 3. Take home Language & Literacy activity for parents
- 4. Language & Literacy Evening for parents and children
