Catalog Description: This course allows students to improve their sentence, paragraph, and essay composition skills so they can succeed in a college level English course.

Conceptual/Thesis – Students will plan and produce writing which is directed by a clear, well-defined thesis statement representing a particular point of view and will detect and identify opinion and bias in the writing of others. <ol style="list-style-type: none"> a. Employ the recursive writing process that includes prewriting, drafting, revising, editing, and proofreading. b. Summarize / paraphrase key information c. Recognize bias and its sources d. Create a clear thesis to direct writing 2. Development and Support – Students will explore ideas in detail and use a range of evidence to support them. <ol style="list-style-type: none"> a. Search a range of scholarly sources for evidence to support thesis b. Identify and select relevant supporting information c. Develop writing by referring to and commenting on selected evidence, linking it to the subject of writing d. Present evidence and quotations accurately and cite them accurately
