Course Description:

A study of genre, style, and technique in short stories, nonfiction, and poetry; emphasis is on creative writing projects that capture the mood and purpose of literary movements.

Course Objectives:

- Learn to read closely as a writer, appreciating the complexity of work by contemporary writers in a wide range of different genres, genders, and cultures.
- Practice a set of strategies for developing an effective writing process, achieving greater self-awareness in how you think, work, and write.
- Increase your ability to respond to works in progress by peers.
- Improve self-assessment skills.
- Professionally present (or self-publish) your best work.

Classroom Activities: Lecture, class discussion, in-class writing assignments. Participation is required. My tasks are to lecture well, to listen, to ask good questions, and to help you find out more about the creative writing process. Your task is to develop your own unique voice.

Evaluation Methods: Class participation, creative writing assignments, workshops, chapbook, pop quizzes.

Classroom Participation and In-class Writing: 20% of course grade. You will be responsible for actively engaging in classroom discussions, and attendance is also a part of your participation grade. If you miss more than two classes, I will take a letter grade off for each day missed. In addition, certain classes you will be assigned in-class writing assignments, which will also count towards your participation grade. These in-class writing assignments will be graded.

Creative Writing Assignments: 40% of course grade. Complete a series of writing projects in various creative forms and genres.

Workshops: 10% of course grade. We will workshop your writing in class. If you are absent for workshop, it is your responsibility to contact one of your classmates and fill out the workshop form.

Chapbook: 20% of course grade. Produce a chapbook of revised creative writing, showing accomplishment in 2 of 3 genres.

Quizzes: 10% of course grade. Quizzes will be given to make sure everyone is reading the material. The quizzes will cover basic information that anyone should be able to remember after a CLOSE reading. All the questions are multiple choice and true or false.

Plagiarism: Cheating on papers and tests will result in an "F" for the course and more – in severe or repeated cases, it can lead to suspension or even expulsion. Many problems in this area are caused by students not knowing how to deal with sources. While it is acceptable to consult legitimate sources of information – scholarly articles and books – the most important thing is to study the assigned texts patiently. Relying on commercial notes may well hinder this process.

Late Essays: Essays are assigned in advance to provide the student ample time to compose and revise work before turning it in. Consequently, an "emergency" arising the night before the essay is due will not constitute a justifiable excuse for the essay's being late. Late essays will lose one letter grade per week tardy.

When absence is necessary due to emergency, it is YOUR RESPONSIBILITY to obtain the assignment from another student or the instructor and complete it by the due date. Students are expected to speak and participate in class and to come to class prepared to discuss the assignment or read from assigned writing exercises. More than 7 absences may result in student being dropped from the course or failed. If you cannot come to class regularly, don't take this particular section of the course.
