Expanded Course Description:

This course examines the relationships between the young child and other members of the family unit and the relationship between the family and the early childhood program. The focus is on the child during infancy, toddler, and preschool years. Studies include the diversity of family lifestyles and cultures.

This course is designed to assist the student who will be working with young children to better understand the dynamics of the family and its impact upon child. The student will study diverse family lifestyles and cultures and how they relate to the child. Growth and development are addressed as to how they impact family relationships. The importance of family involvement in early childhood education and strategies for family communication and involvement will be addressed. Lecture, class discussion and other methods with an emphasis on class participation are the main instructional procedures for this course.
