The Arts Are Alive at Eastern

The Arts are alive and well at Eastern West Virginia Community and Technical College. Many cultural and arts opportunities occurred in 2020 through the college's Arts Society. The Arts Society was established a decade ago to support and promote the creative talents of Eastern's students, faculty, staff, and community.

In Spring 2020, Joe McGee, English faculty and award-winning children's author, became the newest Arts Society coordinator. Of his new responsibilities, Joe says, "I'm proud to be part of the Arts Society. It gives students, faculty, staff, and the community a place to imagine, create, and share their talents." This past spring, the Arts Society published the sixth volume of the Eagle's Nest, a collection of writing, art, and photography. Submitted works came from students, faculty, and staff. In addition to printed copies, the Eagle's Nest publication is available on the Eastern website.

When Eastern moved to predominantly online classes this fall, Kristen Colebank, an artist specializing in watercolor who also serves as the college's instructional technology specialist, started a new virtual art endeavor, Sketch Club, which provides another outlet for Eastern's students, faculty, and staff. By using Microsoft Teams as a virtual forum for the club, participants share their ideas and sketches with others. A guided prompt is provided weekly to get the creative juices flowing. Sketch Club is planning to hold a virtual exhibition during December on the college's Facebook page.

This November, Eastern virtually hosted The Rustic Mechanicals, West Virginia's Shakespeare Troupe, as they released their performance of "A Midsummer Night's Dream" over Zoom. Participants had the opportunity to ask the performers questions through a live Q&A session following the performance. The performance was funded through the West Virginia Humanities Council. In non-pandemic times, the troupe produces three tours a year, hosts several special events, and runs a high school, Apprentice Troupe. They have promised to return in the spring for another performance.

Arts Society Coordinator Joe McGee regularly reminds students and other budding creatives that "Creativity takes courage." Whether it is writing a poem or short story, sketching with a pencil, or painting with watercolors, the Eastern community includes some courageous folks.

Meet Henrietta

This year's enormous and most obvious art effort has been painting the 8-foot chicken statue, known as Henrietta, that sits on the north end of the campus overlooking Corridor H. Local artist Kelson Thorne added his own style to the figure. He used both brushes and spray paint to create his vision, including the Eastern logo. He needed to use more spray paint due to the chicken's features.

When asked about his thoughts on the project, Kelson said, "I was very excited to paint a statue, especially a huge chicken." Henrietta is not the first outdoor art Kelson has added to our community. Kelson painted several outdoor murals in the area this summer, including Queen's Point Coffee in Keyser and the City Pool in Petersburg. He also painted the newly restored Petersburg High School Field House and Locker Room.

Kelson is no stranger to Eastern. His work was displayed during a solo exhibition at Eastern's Eagle's Nest Gallery on the main campus in February.

The painting project was made possible by a generous donation from Pilgrim's Pride.

Eastern Is Proud to Train Area's Healthcare Heroes

Since 2012, Eastern West Virginia Community and Technical College has supplied Registered Nurses to the area's workforce. In fact, nurses who trained at Eastern can be found in West Virginia, Virginia, Maryland, Colorado, and Texas.

Locally, Eastern's nursing graduates are employed at Grant Memorial, Hampshire Memorial, Potomac Valley, WVU Hospitals, Winchester Medical Center, Sentara RMH Medical Center, Garrett Memorial, UPMC Western Medical, Martinsburg VA Medical Center, and numerous local nursing homes, rehabilitation facilities, and doctor's offices.

Eastern's Nursing program is very competitive. The program had more than 50 applicants for the 2020-2022 cohort. Each cohort is limited to 20 students due to program requirements.

The Nursing program recently completed a positive accreditation review by the Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing (ACEN). The reviewers visited the campus in February.

<u>Considering Making a Donation?</u> <u>Consider These New CARES Act Tax incentives</u>

The CARES Act provides additional charitable giving incentives and allows taxpayers, who take the standard deduction, to make up to \$300 of charitable contributions to qualified charities this year. Do you itemize your deductions? The new law allows for cash contributions to qualified charities to be deducted up to 100 percent of your adjusted gross income for the 2020 calendar year.

Many people believe that the state ultimately funds community and technical colleges. Eastern is a state-assisted, not state-supported institution. In FY 2020, the State of West Virginia provided just 42 percent of Eastern's annual budget, shifting the balance to students who can often least afford a college education.
